An important message from the general manager about your bill

I know your utility bills are something you care about, which is why I'm taking the unusual step of addressing you personally about a looming rate hike.

With little public outreach or advance notice to utilities, the King County Council adopted an ordinance in 2016 that we believe amounts to an unlawful tax. If implemented, customers could see their utility bill increase by \$5 per month, per utility, starting this year. A household that receives water, sewer, power and natural gas, could pay \$200 or more per year.

This legislation is called Ordinance 18403, and will require utilities to pay the county "rent" to use the rights-of-way (streets and roads) for water, sewer, power and gas lines in unincorporated King County.

We believe that this is essentially an illegal tax, a revenue-raiser for King County that would go into its General Fund, meaning it could be used for any number of non-utility projects.

More than 21 special-purpose utilities are contesting this tax in a lawsuit (Soos Creek is not part of that suit but we're monitoring closely). King County saw that lawsuit coming and filed an earlier suit of its own against the opposing utilities; it's asking the Superior Court of King County to decide whether the ordinance is an illegal tax or, as the county maintains, a legal rent.

If this tax is upheld, it's your pocketbook that will be hurt. Any new charge or tax on utilities must be passed on to customers. Plus, Soos Creek would have to invest in a new computer system to manage the changes, and that cost would also affect your bills.

HELP WITH UTILITY BILLS

In 2017, 66 low-income, permanently disabled customers and 255 low-income senior citizens took advantage of the 30 percent discount offered through the district's Utility Rate Reduction Program. The total annual cost of the program was \$26,377.27. Based on equivalent residential units, this translates into an annual cost of 42 cents for all water customers and 44 cents for all sewer customers.

The discount doesn't apply to the King County sewage treatment charge, actual water consumption, street lighting, surcharges, and miscellaneous fees or late charges. If you would like an application for the discount program, please visit **www.sooscreek.com** or call **(253) 630-9900**.






Keep Meters Clear

Making meter reading quick and efficient helps keep utility costs down and rates stable.
